Maths challenges

These include in-school half termly challenges, countywide challenges with Newcastle University and Years 7 and 8 entering the UKMT maths challenge.

In particular we'd like to say well done to Matilda Best, Year 9, who was invited to a prize giving evening at Newcastle University following her excellent challenge submission, and well done to James Knox in Year 7 and Oliver Filor in Year 8, who both received silver awards and best in year awards from the UKMT challenge.

Year 8 dive into the past

Students in Year 8 have been studying WWI. As part of this they have been focusing on the experiences of local man Wilf Smith, who joined the Durham Light Infantry in 1914.

He survived the war and died in 1998 aged 102. Students have been investigating the different reasons for him choosing to join the army in 1914, including to win the affections of a girl, as well as what he experienced when he was on the Western Front in France. Students have used the knowledge that they have gained to write letters home from the frontline to Wilf's friend Peter Skelton, telling him about the

things that Wilf experienced during the war. This has helped students understand the impact that the war had on our local area.

Interfaith day

Back in May, all students in Year 9 had the opportunity to meet members of different faiths and world views during an interfaith conference.

As part of Religious Education lessons, the Academy has committed to provide an opportunity for its students to encounter people of other faiths and worldviews; to experience as well as promote respect and tolerance, through the remit of Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Education.

Prior to this, students learnt about what Interfaith Dialogue and Religious Encounter means whilst reflecting on the importance of religious diversity and learning about what it means to have respect and show respect to others, realising its importance in our society.

We were delighted to host nine speakers in school that provided an insight and encounter in their faith or worldview. Our students had the opportunity to develop questions, critically think and analyse as well as put these thoughts to a panel discussion to allow faith members and those with other world views to respond.

The range of speakers included Wendy Gray (Buddhist), Mahshid Turner (Muslim), Deanna Van Der Velde (Jew), Kirtida Richardson (Hindu), Jaswinder Singh (Sikh), Sue White (Anglican, Christian), John Kidd (Methodist, Christian) Carol Spencer (Baha'i) and Susan Walker (Humanist).

Paul Welch, Trust Subject Director for RE noted "this is a

really valuable learning opportunity to encounter faith members and those with other world views to try and gain an insight and understanding of the impact of faith and world views in their lives as well as gain a greater understanding of how this is expressed."

Part of the fundamental British Values are 'mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith'. At the Hermitage Academy we seek to prepare our students to be more aware of the community and surroundings in which they live as well as become global citizens accepting and celebrating diversity.



Scientific success!

There's been plenty to celebrate this term in the science department. From STEM solutions to taking science outside of our school, here's a quick snapshot...

We have had a few events in science this term. Miss Hannon's industrial cadets have been hard at work since

February producing a STEM based solution for the problem of creating a zero-waste world. In June, their hard work was recognised when they were nominated for two awards; best STEM solution and determination. They visited Newcastle University for a full day to share their project (they created a website from scratch) and see other competitor's work.
