Students have played an active role in planting and nurturing the garden, and they have used it as the backdrop for charity events and staff gatherings.

We hope to secure further funding to expand and enhance this area which is so popular with everyone in school. We extend our gratitude to our special guests for taking a keen interest in this little corner of greenery that has flourished within our school grounds.

#### **Ski instructor**

An Events Planner has a varied role, ensuring events run smoothly, whether they are on a small scale or huge scale.
